### Turf fields update

Thanks to legislation passed by the Oregon Legislature June 27, Keizer has been awarded \$750,000 in state funding to help complete Phase III of the turf field project at Keizer Rapids Park.

The state money was part of House Bill 5006, a package funding local projects statewide. City Manager Adam Brown said Rep. Kevin Mannix worked to get the Keizer project included. The money will support Phase III -- paving the gravel parking lot, adding a storage building and improving drainage.

Mr. Brown said Phase II of the fields project, which includes adding bathrooms, a concession area and extending pathways, will be finished by the end of summer. This was funded in part with \$128,000 in lodging tax revenue and \$238,000 in city development revenue.

He said Phase III has a little over \$1 million in funding so far toward the \$1.3 million estimated cost. Engineering plans are being finalized and bids will go out depending on when fundraising is complete. The City will be looking at naming right possibilities for the complex, including the sports complex itself and individual fields. (Credit in part to July 4 Keizertimes story.)

### Field operation issue

Meanwhile, the City has been addressing some field operation issues, including hours of operation and lighting. Fields are being managed through contract with the Keizer Community Fields group, which had requested a change in rules around lighting and time of departure. In testimony at the July 8 Parks Advisory Board meeting, Rhonda Rich, WKNA President, and two Tate Avenue neighbors who live next to the park, requested retaining the 9 p.m. lights dim/9:30 departure deadlines. After much discussion, the Board kicked the decision for any change back to Council. Rhonda and Tate neighbors again testified at City Council on July 21. Council affirmed retaining the 9/9:30 p.m. rules.

## Pavilion proposal

Elsewhere at Keizer Rapids, City Manager Brown said the proposal for building an event pavilion has to go back to the Parks Advisory Board for deliberation – Aug. 12 at the soonest. That discussion would include the project consultant, who then would draft a recommendation for further Parks board consideration. Council would then deliberate on the Parks Board’s recommendation on the project.

## Big Toy paint party

City Councilor Marlene Parsons helped organize a team of at least 37 volunteers July 19 to spruce up the ever-popular Big Toy installation at KRP. At the July 21 Council meeting, she thanked all those who helped, with a special shout-out to “paint guru” Beth Melandy. Volunteers scraped off old paint, sanded, prepped and painted for hours to bring the structure back to vibrancy. Councilor Parsons thanked Odd Moe’s Pizza for supplying an after-work meal and Sherwin Williams for heavily discounted paint. A second paint day Sept. 13 will tackle needed second coats, other touch-ups and some murals. Volunteers are welcome but most tasks will require working on ladders, so minors will not be eligible to help with that, Parsons said.

Organizers estimated 160 families and multiple partner organizations participated. Partner organizations included Keizer Police and Fire Departments Keizer Community Library, Early Learning HUB, Chemeketa Community College, Pacific Source and more.

Participants connected with a variety of community resources at the event. More than 500 hot dogs and 500 hamburgers were served and a community raffle resulted in more than 70 gifts to kids and adults. They included 36 \$25 gift cards, 4 bikes for teens and children and oranges and apples given away to all participants.

## Pilot Street Crossing Flag Program

West Keizer Neighborhood Association is sponsoring a pilot pedestrian street crossing flag project on Chemawa Road by Keizer Rapid Park. WKNA Board member (and city Traffic Safety Bikeways Pedestrian Comm. Member) Brenda Lamb assembled flags and signage for the project, which was in place in early June. A second crosswalk site for the pilot project is being sought in West Keizer, but it has to be an actual crosswalk on a 30 mph or less street. So far, the test has gone well. It will continue throughout the fall.



## September Speaker Preview

Jim Trett, Mayor of Detroit, Ore., since 2016, will share a firsthand account of the devastating 2020 Beachie Creek and Lionshead wildfires and their impact on Detroit and the Santiam Canyon. He will also talk about the future of Detroit Lake, including the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers proposed 2026 lake drawdown and a local project to excavate earth beneath the city's two marinas—aimed at expanding recreational opportunities.

Following the 2020 wildfires—which destroyed 90% of the community—Jim has led a dedicated team of elected officials and volunteers in the ongoing effort to rebuild their community. Jim also retains deep community ties in Keizer, where he lived from the age of 7 before relocating to Detroit. Jim dedicated 35 years to the Keizer Fire District as both a volunteer firefighter/EMT and staff member and continues to teach First Aid and CPR classes at Whiteaker Middle School and provide First Aid coverage at various sporting events.
