

 - Motorists misjudging gaps or running stop



Previous Engineering Efforts



- Recently updated signage
- Currently meets engineering standards
- Applied for grants for larger improvements

In all four directions:

- STOP signs
- Red beacons
- “Stop Ahead” signs
- Pavement legends
- “New Traffic Pattern Ahead” signs (temporary)



Additionally, in NB/SB direction on River Rd:

- 2 Amber beacons on “Stop Ahead” signs
- 2 Portable Changeable Message Signs (temporary)



- **Update** – The Concept Plan considers the Trail in four segments – Coastal, Valley, River, and Canyon. Coastal and Valley segment master planning is complete and partners are working to identify catalyst projects and implementation opportunities. The River and Canyon segment planning project is fully funded and currently in progress.
 - **Salmonberry Trail River and Canyon Segments Plan Review Committee** – Regional Solutions and Oregon Department of Forestry have co-convened a diverse group of individuals to inform the next steps of the Salmonberry Trail's development. Committee members met for the first time this week for introductions and orientation. Oregon State Parks and Department of Forestry provided an overview of the Salmonberry Trail, its history, and planning updates. The committee will meet again in the coming weeks to review a summary of the base conditions for the river and canyon segments.
 - **Salmonberry Trail – Valley Segment** – The Metro Regional Solutions Team hosted Salmonberry Trail partners and agencies to discuss master planning and implementation for the Valley Segment of the Salmonberry Trail, located in Washington County. Strategic alignment of bi-regional Regional Solutions and state agency engagement will further advance this regionally significant trail project. Mid-Valley Region – Jody Christensen

- **Marion County Public Health and People of Color (POC) Leaders Meeting** – In partnership with Marion County Commissioner Kevin Cameron, RS convenes the weekly meeting.
 - This week, the health department director gave an overview of the draft Marion County Public Health Testing Strategy. Several areas were highlighted where the county is seeking input for the POC leaders. The group will provide feedback over the next few days and will continue to work on this “living” document.
- **Mid-Valley Community Outreach Alliance**, a Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC) group meeting weekly, includes representatives from Pineros Y Campesinos Unidos del Noroeste (PCUN), Mujeres Luchadoras Progresistas (MLP), Latino Business Alliance (LBA), Oregon Human Development Corporation (OHDC), Oregon Employment Office – Woodburn, Advanced Economic Solutions, Farmworker Housing Development Corp (FHDC), Unidos Bridging Community, Western Oregon University (WOU) Multicultural Center, Mano a Mano – Salem, Izo Marketing, City of Independence - Community Engagement, Portland General Electric (PGE), Oregon Childhood Development Coalition (OCDL), Oregon Education Association, the Higher Education Coordinating Committee (HECC), Northwest Human Services, AHIVYO!, Consulado de Mexico en Portland, Micronesian Islander Community OREGON and Capaces Leadership. Strategic Economic Development Corp (SEDCOR), Willamette Workforce Partnership (WWP), the Mid-Willamette Valley Council of Governments (MWVCOG), Business Oregon, and the Chemeketa Small Business Development Center join the meetings as well.
 - This week's discussion focused on the region's key industry sectors and economic drivers. RS was seeking recommendations for BIPOC business owners and leaders who could engage with the Equity in Recovery strategy. RS will be following up on the recommendations.

RESOLUTION FOR THE CITY OF KEIZER TO BE AN INCLUSIVE CITY

WHEREAS, Immigrants and refugees of all nations have contributed to the health, well-being, and general welfare of the City of Keizer as families and neighbors;

WHEREAS, Immigrants and refugees of all nations have contributed to the prosperity of Oregon as workers and taxpayers;

WHEREAS, Inclusion and integration of all residents of Keizer is a vital concern for the general welfare of Keizer in all respects;

WHEREAS, Discrimination based on national origin, or perceived national origin, race, ethnicity, language, gender identity, sexual orientation, marital status, disability, income, citizenship status, or religion is a chronic aspect of life for many Oregonians;

WHEREAS, Chronic discrimination leads to community disengagement, diminished opportunities for integration, increased stigmatization, greater incidents of health morbidity;

WHEREAS, Chronic discrimination negatively impacts local economic activity;

WHEREAS, Promotion of health, well-being, and general welfare are core obligations of Keizer,

WHEREAS, Prosperity requires harnessing all of Keizer's available labor, skills, and ideas to grow Keizer's economy and expand opportunities,

WHEREAS, Every Keizer resident should be treated with compassion and respect regardless of identity, national origin or citizenship status;

WHEREAS, Under the national constitution, the immigration power to exclude and deport is reserved exclusively to the national government,

NOW, THEREFORE, KEIZER RESOLVES that Keizer is an Inclusive City that embraces, celebrates, and welcomes all residents of any national origin, race, ethnicity, language, gender identity, sexual preference, marital status, disability, income, citizenship status, or religion, and their contributions to the collective prosperity of all residents; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the use of City funds, personnel or equipment for the enforcement of federal immigration law is prohibited; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the provision of services or benefits by Keizer shall not be conditioned upon a resident's federal immigration status, religion, race, ethnicity, country of origin, language, gender identity, sexual preference, marital status, disability, income, and citizenship status, except as required by federal or State law.

Dear City Council,

I am writing to you to inform you that I stand with LUS Youth in their movement to hold the Salem-Keizer School Board accountable for their refusal to listen to the voices of their community, which they are said to represent, as well as their racist actions, remarks, and affiliations. I am sure you are already aware of the specifics, but if you are not I suggest you reach out to LUS Youth for more information, which they will gladly provide if they haven't already.

As leaders, it is your job to not only create policy to benefit our city, but also to use your platform as a mouthpiece. I ask that you, as a council, address the racism in our school board and request for the resignation of the offending board members. Specifically, Marty Heyen, a proud associate of the white supremacist group III%. If you cannot make this statement as a unified council, I request that you each take responsibility for your own voices and speak out. You are our leaders, you should be making your voices heard so your community knows exactly where you stand.

Additionally it has come to my attention that the Keizer Police Department has held an event during which they were not wearing masks. I, myself, have witnessed several officers not wearing masks while out and about, specifically when they are well within six feet of citizens. These are public employees, and their refusal to wear masks is a threat to public health and safety.

Finally, I'd like to address council member Daniel Kholer. You recently sent a rather unprofessional email to a concerned citizen named Summer. I have read the email, and I am embarrassed that an elected official would engage in this kind of communication, clearly aimed at intimidating and silencing a citizen. It was clear you were upset. In the future, I suggest releasing that tension in a more private manner rather than through official communication from your position of leadership. Maybe try journaling.

Thank you for your time and attention. Your city is watching.

Thank you for contacting me about River Road and Quinaby.

The Council and I agree with you that the intersection needs to be improved for safety.

Marion County already had plans in the works to get this done and will be presenting the improvements at our city council meeting on Monday, August 22. Construction is being scheduled and they may have dates to share with us then. I am thankful that Marion County is getting this done. While only a roundabout would eliminate people running stop signs, the planned 4 way stop will reduce the severity of crashes when they do happen.

For baseball at Keizer Little League Park, the organizers have been observing the protocols for outdoor venues to keep the players and other participants safe. We have not been alerted to any contact tracing that has led to the baseball tournaments. More cars would be expected since carpooling is not a good idea. Keizer Little League and the tournament organizers know that their compliance with public health requirements is the only way to safely run these events for all involved.

I have a couple of concerns I would like to address.

First: The intersection of Clearlake Rd/Quinaby and River Rd. I am aware of the fatality that happened last week and many others that have happened over the years. One of my biggest concerns with that intersection is that the Hitchin Post is allowing cars to park on the edge of River Rd making it difficult to see if you are heading west across River rd or turning left onto River Rd from Quinaby. Also, the angle of the intersection makes it hard to navigate. It's like playing frogger and who gets across the intersection the fastest. I do believe it's time that Marion County does something to make this intersection a little safer.

Secondly: The amount of people participating in the baseball/softball activities during a pandemic is mind boggling. Ridge Drive is often loaded with cars, the amount of people congregating in the parking lot of KLL field is astounding. I rarely see people wearing masks. This is something that is being allowed to happen and it's making it worse on those that are trying to do the right thing so we can keep the economy open.
